a whole new world

So [the women who were told of Jesus resurrection] went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone for they were afraid. Mark 16:8 NRSV

“See, I am making all things new.” Rev. 21:5 NRSV

We are so used to the joy of Easter that the fearful reaction of the women who first heard the good news of Jesus’ resurrection seems odd. The Easter event tells us that Christ has conquered death, and because he rose, we too shall be

raised to live with God forever. So why were the women at that first Easter so afraid?

I wonder if they were afraid because they knew Easter meant the end of the world to which they had grown accustomed, that God was opening a

brand-new, unfamiliar future for them. Because this future worked by new rules where the dead did not stay dead and old patterns were being replaced with new, I wonder if it filled them with both terror and exhilaration. Jesus’ resurrection meant that their old ways of navigating the world were ending, and if they told anyone, it would be the end for them too.

No longer was God separated from God’s people. No longer would they have to live only for themselves since their future was secure. Now God would live in and through them. And as God lived in them, God would change them, just as God had already changed their future. (continued on following page)

Interestingly, their future included persecution, imprisonment, exile, and execution—scary things. However, God changed them from being fearful followers, to courageous leaders who, with the rest of the early disciples, boldly proclaimed the good news to people throughout the world. (Without them, I would not need to write this article.) Despite their fears, they experienced



peace, joy, and hope beyond their wildest imaginations. They came to accept the future as something not to be afraid of, but something to be embraced—a future filled with God who gives life to the dead and courage to the fearful.

We at Messiah have been giving a lot of thought, prayer, and discernment time to the future to which God is calling us. At a Special Meeting of the Congregation on Sunday, March 18, the Church Leadership Team will be inviting your support of a capital campaign to bring a Mission Developer to the staff of Messiah, replace the roofs, retire the debt, and establish a sinking fund for future years.

grapple with the changing metrics of “success” for a thriving and vital church, fear is a natural and nearby feeling. We wonder if we can afford these changes both financially and emotionally, and we mourn the fact that, once again, our resurrection God is calling us out of our familiar and secure patterns and into paths untrodden. If we engage this process without noticing that we are always being made new by a God who brings life out of death, fear will reign and we will be tempted to pine for the past.

In our better moments as Christians, we realize we do not need to focus on our fears or our sense of scarcity that persistently wants to cling to the old world and its old ways. In our better moments, we instead focus on God. We look to what God has done and is doing in our own lives and in the life of this dear community we call Messiah. When we do, we see a consistent, reliable pattern to God’s life-giving promise of new life.

God has and is doing great things at Messiah and promises to be with us in doing new things in the future. They may seem scary, but God gives courage and faith. The one who raised Jesus from the dead will see to that. Our God is always making things new.

May God bless you this Easter season with the confidence of new life in God’s name. And may God bless all of us as we move confidently into the future where God is already working.

does faith have to be at the center of our conversations to be at the center of our lives?

A few weeks ago I finally launched my internship project. In case you were unaware, every intern has completed some type of project while at Messiah. For my project, I have started a small group for young adults with a goal of 50% of the participants identifying as none (those who are spiritual but not religious).

I'll admit that part of the origin of this group is in selfish nature. Both my wife and I want to belong to a community of people who are around the same ages as us. And honestly that is really tough to find in the church.

Another hope for this group is to answer a question I have been wrestling with since arriving at Messiah... "Does faith have to be at the center of our conversations to be at the center of our lives?" This is a difficult question to ask and one I am not sure I entirely know the answer to.

But I hope to learn from this group, because one thing is apparently clear... yes, we may talk about God and our faith... but it will most likely not be the primary topic of conversation. This is a group of people who want to share what is going on in their lives, their joys and struggles, their hopes and dreams, and the numerous life changes that occur in these critical years of life.

Maybe conversations of faith and God come up as we meet... maybe not. But I wonder if God isn't up to something bigger and beyond our reach. Maybe God is planting a seed in this group to be and do something incredible.

Maybe the majority of these participants step back into a church... or maybe not. I'm not sure that is the goal of ministry. I'm not sure we are called to recruit people to join our building. Maybe instead, we are called to go out and love those around us and spread God's love in word and action. Maybe this group will lean more into the latter. Regardless, I feel God is up to something incredible and it is beyond my control. All I can do is strap in and go along for the ride!

a living faith

“Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness...” Matthew 6:33

I think back to my beginnings. Before I was born, my heavenly Father knew me! He knew the parents I needed, the values they would teach, the hardships we would face. As missionaries to Brazil in the 1950’s, my parents took a leap of faith, following the call of God on their lives. In the midst of that faith walk, I was born in a straw thatch hut with a dirt floor, my father holding a flashlight for a native midwife.

Shortly after my birth, my parents were called back to the states where my father built a church, starting with simple children’s Bible studies on the weekend in the backyard. These expanded into additional adult bible classes and eventually to Sunday worship and Sunday school all held in our home. This was my life growing up as a toddler through high school until the church was finally able to support the building of a facility on the back lot. In all of this, my dad refused to take a salary from the church and worked outside full time as a postman during the week.

You may ask what it was like being a child where every weekend, our home was turned into a battlefield of cleaning and being ready for the neighborhood to walk through for church and Sunday School? Our bedrooms, living room and kitchen were used for classrooms and our double car garage was the sanctuary. Everything had to be spit polished and clean. I DID NOT LIKE IT!

Nothing was private, nothing was sacred. Everything belonged to... God and the church. If we were misbehaving in church (it was our home after all!), my dad would not think twice about bringing us on stage and disciplining us as a Children’s Message or sermonette. I DID NOT LIKE IT!

My parents forced me to join a Bible Memory Association where every week I memorized and recited different verses of scripture for small rewards, like pencils, erasers and various knick-knacks and eventually a summer week of camp. They started out with one or two verses a week as a toddler, to six or seven verses as an eight year old, to ten or eleven verses in middle school, to finally fifteen to twenty verses a week in high school. I was

forced to recite different passages to my Sunday School teacher, every week. I DID NOT LIKE IT!

At age seven, my grandparents agreed to pay for one hour of piano lessons for me and my three siblings. My older brother was given 30 minutes and the rest of us were given ten minutes of lessons EACH. But can you believe it? We ALL had to practice an HOUR every day! I DID NOT LIKE IT! I would rather have been outside playing sandlot football with my friends. I just couldn’t wait until I left for college. FREEDOM!

Funny thing about freedom, it is all about choices. I could choose whatever I WANTED to do. So I chose not to go to church. I chose not to continue my daily exposure in God’s Word. I chose not to practice. It didn’t take more than a few months of this revolution against my training

to recognize my soul was dead. I came back to church, I began reading my Bible again, I chose a music major and instead of an hour a day of practice, I practiced four hours a day, even eight or nine hours a day during the summer break. I WANTED to feel those things that had been integrally woven into the fabric of my soul by my parents under God’s prompting. And the seeds of faith planted by my parents, though never previously appreciated, healed my soul and made sense.

I did not play as “hard ball” as my parents in the lives of my own children, but they always had the example of their parents in making priority for God and the church every week. I thank God for the tilling of the soil of my heart through my parents and I trust God that seeds planted in our children will spring forth into life for all who are to come.

Each spring, my children Molly, Jack, and Everett eagerly help with our garden. They love to plant the seeds, push the dirt around, and overwater. I know through the many years we have been sowing our seeds that this is a joyful experience for them. They wait for weeks to see the green starts push through the soil and are overjoyed when they finally appear. It seems miraculous to them—the small green shoots coming up from the tiny little seeds they planted weeks before. It is always a miracle to me as I am never sure what will sprout from their frenzied planting sessions!

Each child has his or her own gardening style.

Molly is patient and careful, watering and checking



the sprouts daily and giving me reports on what has sprung up.

Jack is focused but silly, giving the seedlings his full attention as he sings songs and talks to them.

Everett has non-stop questions about the seedlings as he overwaters half of them and leaves the others bone dry.

“How many are there? How big will they get, Mom? Do I like to eat these? What color is the food they make?”



Can you show me a picture of the veggie? When will they be ready to pick?”

We do many ordinary things when we create a garden. Each day we water, weed, thin seedlings, track the sunshine, and water some more. We care for the plants throughout the spring and summer, faithfully giving ourselves over to the task of tending the garden we have created together. When it is time, the children joyfully harvest the vegetables, flowers, and fruits.

These ordinary, everyday actions in looking after our


garden culminate into a bountiful harvest we can share with others.

Over the course of my years in youth ministry, it is still amazing to me how you never know how something will impact another’s faith. You could say, “You never know when a seed has been planted.” Sometimes I think the seeds may be small or sometimes a little bit bigger.

I think back to a high school student who came regularly to the Tuesday morning high school breakfast. Years later, I was at Camp Lutherwood and I recognized a counselor. I finally realized he was a past attendee at high school breakfast. He told me he had decided to go to college at Pacific Lutheran University. He had no connection with the Lutheran church except for breakfast, but he said he felt good going to a Lutheran college because of that connection. At school, he became active in a weekly Bible Study. Now here he was working at a Lutheran summer camp.

There was a small seed of faith that had been planted and now had grown so that this student without a church background could now be actively involved in multiple faith communities. This was a story I may have never heard, but maybe it was a God-Incidence that I did.

When I was in high school, I had the privilege of attending two ELCA National Youth Gatherings. Being with 30,000 other Lutheran youth and leaders is something incredible to experience. Seeing the sheer number of people and famous speakers and musicians is truly inspiring. For me it was the first time that I understood how large the Lutheran community extends as I heard impactful stories of God’s work in the world. I am very excited to be taking a group of Messiah high school youth to the ELCA National Youth Gathering in Houston this summer. This is an opportunity to plant some “big seeds of faith” in the lives of these young people.

I wonder what other incredible faith stories are out there because of seeds Messiah has planted. We can trust that God will use those seeds and maybe someday they will truly start to sprout.
